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Diverse Perspectives in Funded Activities

CNES recognizes that many points of view exist on any given topic when bringing together varied audiences to analyze and discuss the past, present, and future of the Middle East and North Africa. A high value is placed in hearing and understanding multiple points of view and examining questions fundamental to diverse perspectives on controversial issues such as the environment, human rights, and gender studies. It is essential for students to be exposed to, to understand, and to personally experience equity, intercultural concepts and perspectives in the basic communication arenas of the classroom, the lecture hall, and the public event. Diverse perspectives facilitate thinking and professional competency on behalf of future education professionals and global citizens. For example, CNES funded a series on Israel-Palestine and the United Nations-sponsored Goldstone Report. Entitled *Perspectives on The Goldstone Report and International Law*, CNES hosted a varied group of political approaches that included the representative from Human Rights Watch, a UCLA Law School Professor and Executive Director of UCLA's International Human Rights Program, the legal advisor to Israel's Ministry of Foreign Affairs as well as a Palestinian law professor involved in Middle East peace negotiations. Learning about and acknowledging these diverse perspectives are an essential part of designing effective educational communications. Consequently, at CNES, the revamped public website, podcasts and videocasts are additional steps toward the goal of facilitating communication about our interconnected world among key constituents: students, academics, the media, and especially an American public thirsty for informed, varied news and discussion about the region. A wide range of perspectives can co-exist about learning, teaching, and instruction within

and across different academic disciplines. Students are central to the work of the Center that promotes education and outreach as lifelong processes to be viewed from various focuses (collaborative learning, different quantitative and qualitative research methods, and multiple viewpoints across, religion, ethnicity, gender and political affiliations).

CNES aims to connect diverse perspectives in research on learning, teaching and instruction with the intention of exploring and discussing comprehensive interdisciplinary ideas. By connecting these diverse perspectives, researchers, scholars, community members, and students broaden their views and learn from each other, all of which leads to synergies of participation and inclusion for future theoretical and empirical research. Breaking down apparent dichotomies between mainstream and marginal approaches, CNES in tandem with our expanding group of recently hired scholars, offer fresh ideas for understanding the region's evolving religious expression and political change.

Areas of National Need

Through a variety of CNES-supported programs and courses, students are actively introduced to the concept of service to local communities, to their country, and to the wider regional sphere of the Middle East and North Africa. In its commitment to service in the military, the Peace Corps, or other national organizations that address early childhood education, global health issues, high school heritage language learning, and education abroad programs, CNES provides information, knowledge, and access to increase student and faculty opportunities in areas of national need. Examples are the full year Education Abroad Programs as well as summer language, literature, and culture study offered both overseas and on campus. These programs enable CNES to provide opportunities for students and the public at large to improve linguistic skills in the

national need category of lesser-taught Middle East languages (Arabic, Armenian, Persian, Turkish, and Hebrew). In addition to a wide array of courses and lectures taught by internationally acclaimed faculty, CNES produces open source language learning modules ("Turkish Tutor" and "Listen and Learn") for modern spoken dialects such as Iraqi, Moroccan and Egyptian Arabic as well as Azeri, Persian and Turkish. CNES has tracked stellar results in producing generations of CNES-funded foreign language specialists since 1957, who teach critical Middle East languages in an elementary or secondary school or postsecondary institution, or serve in American government agencies in positions requiring the use of a critical foreign language.

CNES partners with UCLA's School of Public Health and other professional schools to educate public health practitioners and future business leaders in linguistic and cultural awareness projects relevant to representing the United States by working and residing in the Middle East. CNES fosters on-going close collaborations with UCLA's Law School and its Human Rights Program as well as the program in Islamic Law housed in the Law School to enrich career and educational opportunities for public interest legal professionals and those providing legal services specific to international relation with the Middle East. Professional school students in the applied sciences, technology, engineering and mathematics constitute significant sectors of our student body eager to enrich professional school curricula with expertise about the Middle East and North Africa.
